Beyond the Principal's Office: How Schools Handle Student Behavior

It's a moment many parents dread: the unexpected call or email from school. Your heart sinks as you learn your child was involved in a behavioral incident. In that instant, a rush of questions and concerns can be overwhelming. What exactly happened? What are the consequences? It's natural to feel anxious and to picture a rigid, punitive process.

However, the reality of how modern schools, including SKE, manage student conduct is more nuanced, thoughtful, and constructive than the past. It is a process built on a partnership between educators and families, designed to guide children toward better choices. The goal is not simply to assign blame or punishment but to use these challenging moments as teachable opportunities. The process is guided by principles that prioritize fairness, respect, and student growth.

1. The Goal Isn't Punishment—It's Growth

The primary objective when addressing a behavioral issue is not punitive, but educational. When a student's actions don't meet expectations, our first step is to understand what happened and why. Staff—including teachers, counselors, and the principal—often work directly with families to form a problem-solving team focused on helping the student learn from the experience, recognize the impact of their actions on others, and develop essential life skills for managing conflict in the future.

This approach focuses on repairing relationships and guiding students toward making amends, such as offering a sincere apology, engaging in school service or completing targeted learning opportunities. Traditional responses, such as detentions or suspensions, may also be considered, as needed. The entire process is built on a philosophy of fostering personal responsibility and positive change.

Our staff is committed to a respectful problem-solving process that builds students' capacity to handle conflict in life.

2. There's No One-Size-Fits-All Answer

Schools recognize that every child and every situation is unique. Guided by our Code of Conduct, the principal and teachers handle each incident on a case-by-case basis, carefully considering the student's age, developmental stage, personal history, and the specific circumstances of the incident. This individualized approach is essential for fairness and effectiveness. It also extends to students with diverse abilities, acknowledging that a disability may affect a student's ability to follow the Code of Conduct and may require different support strategies.

This nuanced method provides support that is logical and appropriate for the specific child.

While the approach is individualized, this does not mean a lack of seriousness for certain behaviors. The school takes a firm and committed stance against actions that harm the community. Behavior that discriminates against others based on race, gender, religion, disability, or other protected characteristics is addressed seriously to ensure a safe and inclusive environment for all students.

3. You Won't Get the Full Story—For a Good Reason

When an incident involves multiple students, it is natural for a parent to want every detail. However, you will likely find that we can only share information directly related to your own child. This is not a lack of transparency but adherence to a legal and ethical obligation: protecting the privacy and confidentiality of every student.

Personal information about other children involved in an incident cannot be shared. This commitment to privacy ensures that all students are protected and that sensitive information is handled with the utmost care.

4. A Delayed Response Doesn't Mean a Lack of Action

In the age of instant communication, it can be frustrating to wait for a call or email from the school. But a delay in communication does not mean the issue is being ignored. On the contrary, it often means a thoughtful process is already underway.

Before contacting families, school staff—including teachers, counselors, and administrators—need time to work together to gather accurate information and understand the complete picture. Immediate communication is not always possible due to the realities of elementary school life.

This pause is essential for staff to gather the necessary information to ensure the response is measured and just, not rushed and reactive. Parents are always welcome to reach out, and staff will do the same as soon as they are able.

Conclusion: A Partnership in Problem-Solving

Navigating student behavior is one of the most complex responsibilities of any school. Our approach at SKE is a compassionate, collaborative process focused on creating a safe environment where respect is paramount and mistakes become opportunities for growth. It is a system built not just on rules, but on understanding and guidance. We very much value the partnership we have with parents and caregivers in addressing challenges - together!

Our grade 6s are currently studying the book "Refugee" by Alan Gratz, taught by Mrs. Morgan. This book explores issues of displacement and disconnection, through the perspectives of three young people fleeing unsafe situations. Here at SKE, our students had the privilege to be joined by SKE parent Rosarina Saw, who shared her personal experience of being a refugee earlier in her life.

Thinking critically and deeply about what we are reading, and drawing connections to our own lives is a key part of our learning priorities this year. See this at work in the included student quotes.

"I learned that children at a very young age had to be running and sleeping in caves and I find this shocking because nobody in our class had to do that. It's horrible because no kid should have to grow up like that."

SKE Cold Weather Guidelines



Students must be dressed properly for the weather. Students wait outside until the morning bell rings and they are expected to go outside for some fresh air at lunch and recess. *Students must be dressed appropriately for the weather so that they remain safe and comfortable during these outside playtimes.*

We do not have a school or district policy for cold weather procedures. However, the following guidelines are in place at South Kelowna Elementary School.

BELOW FREEZING (-1 Celsius to -15)

Students will go outside. Parents should ensure that their child brings the following items needed to stay warm and comfortable when outside:

- Warm Coat
- Gloves/Mittens
- Head/Ear covering
- Boots
- Waterproof snow pants



<u>-15 to -20 Celsius</u>

Students will go outside providing the wind is calm and the students will be able to stay dry. The Environment Canada website (http://www.weatheroffice.gc.ca) will be used to check weather conditions. The same clothing items as noted above should be worn. If the wind starts to pick up, we will ring the bell early and allow students to come inside to their classroom for the remainder of the outside play time.

TEMPERATURE REACHES -20 Celsius

If the temperature reaches minus 20 Celsius, and the grounds are dry and the wind is calm, students will go outside for 15 minutes. After 15 minutes, the bell will ring to allow students to come inside to their classroom for the remainder of the outside play time.

TEMPERATURE REACHES -20 Celsius (with windy conditions)

If the temperature reaches -20 Celsius, and it is windy, students will stay inside their classrooms during lunch and recess

We are excited to host a school-wide Harmony Day Cultural Picnic on Thursday, November 20th, 2025, celebrating diversity, inclusion, and community spirit.


